Cheers for Sistas Who Succeed - women pioneers who are shining in their careers! Ruth E. Carter is one of today's most sought after and renowned costume designers. She is the first African-American to win an Academy Award in the Best Costume Design category for Black Panther (2018). She has earned two Academy Award nominations for "Best Costume Design" for Spike Lee's Malcolm X (1993) and Steven Spielberg's Amistad (1998). Carter also won an Emmy nomination for the reboot of ROOTS and is known for her work on Dolemite Is My Name (2019). The consummate professional, Ruth E. Carter has worked in the industry for over three decades and has been credited with over forty films. We salute this sista who succeeds with her passion for fashion! (ruthecarter.com; imdb.com)



Viola Davis is an incomparable actress who has a gift for using acting as a transformative craft. She is the first black actress to receive an Emmy Award for Outstanding Lead Actress in a Drama Series for How to Get Away with Murder (2014). As of 2017, she has appeared in four films that were nominated for the Best Picture Oscar: Traffic (2000), Extremely Loud & Incredibly Close (2011), The Help (2011) and Fences (2016). In 2017, Davis became the 25th performer (and first African-American actress) to have won the Triple Crown of Acting (an Oscar, Emmy and Tony). Sheila C. Johnson is an entrepreneur and philanthropist whose accomplishments span the arenas of hospitality, sports, TV/film, the arts, education and humanitarian causes. She is a woman who wears many hats and is CEO of Salamander Hospitality, LLC, where she oversees a growing portfolio of luxury properties. As Vice Chairman of Monumental Sports & Entertainment and President and Managing Partner of the WNBA's Washington Mystics, Johnson is the first African-American woman to have a stake in three professional sports teams including the Washington Wizards (NBA) and the Washington Capitals (NHL). As a founding partner of Black Entertainment Television, she pioneered modern television programming and created the award-winning program Teen Summit, an issues-oriented talk show for the network's youth viewers. Currently, Johnson produces films that convey a strong humanitarian message, with completed projects including Kicking It, A Powerful Noise, She Is The Matador and her latest film, The Other City, about the HIV/AIDS crisis in Washington DC. 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POWER PROFILER: DIANA ROSS

Diana Ross is an iconic singer, actress, and record producer. Born and raised in Detroit, Michigan, Ross rose to fame as the lead singer of the vocal group, The Supremes, who during the 1960s became Motown's most successful act, and are the best-charting female group in US history, as well as one of the world's best-selling girl groups of all time. The group released a record-setting twelve number one hit singles on the U.S. Billboard Hot 100, including "Where Did Our Love Go", "Baby Love", "Come See About Me", "Stop! In the Name of Love", "You

Can't Hurry Love", "You Keep Me Hangin' On", "Love Child", and "Someday We'll Be Together".

Following her departure from the Supremes in 1970, Ross released her eponymous debut solo album that same year, featuring the No. 1 Pop hit "Ain't No Mountain High Enough." She later released the album "Touch Me in the Morning" in 1973; its title track was her second solo No. 1 hit. She continued a successful solo career through the 1970s, which included hit albums like Mahogany and Diana Ross and their No. 1 hit singles, "Theme from Mahogany" and "Love Hangover", respectively. Her 1980 album "Diana" produced another No. 1 single, "Upside Down", as well as the international hit "I'm

Diana Ross is an iconic singer, Coming Out." Her final single with Motown during her initial run with the company ess, and record producer. Born achieved her sixth and final U.S. number one Pop hit, the duet "Endless Love" featuring raised in Detroit, Michigan, Lionel Richie, whose solo career was launched with its success.

Ross has also ventured into acting, with a Golden Globe Award-winning and Academy Award-nominated performance in the film "Lady Sings the Blues" (1972); she recorded its soundtrack, which became a number one hit. She also starred in two other feature films, "Mahogany" (1975) and "The Wiz" (1978), later acting in the television films "Out of Darkness" (1994), for which she also was nominated for a Golden Globe Award, and Double Platinum (1999).

She is the only female artist to have number one singles as a solo artist; as the other half of a duet (Lionel Richie); as a member of a trio; and as an ensemble member (We are the World-USA for Africa). In 1976, Ross was named the "Female Entertainer of the Century" by Billboard magazine. In 1993, the Guinness Book of World Records declared her the most successful female music artist in history, due to her success in the United States and United Kingdom for having more hits than any female artist in the charts, with a career total of 70 hit singles with her work with the Supremes and as a solo artist. She had a top 10 UK hit in every one of the last five decades, and sang lead on a top 75 hit single at least once every year from 1964 to 1996 in the UK, a period of 33 consecutive years and a record for any performer.

In 1988, Ross was inducted to the Rock and Roll Hall of Fame as a member of the Supremes, alongside Mary Wilson and Florence Ballard. She was the recipient of the Kennedy Center Honors in 2007, the Grammy Lifetime Achievement Award in 2012, and the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 2016.
